Sharing reliable information

- Un-biased and commercially impartial
- Information based on shared experiences, not myths and rumours
- Balanced, with perspective of staff and residents
- Technical support of energy specialist, able to interpret and explain without profit motive

Key successes of SHARE forums to date

- Demonstration flat for residents
- Central heating specification advice
- Grant funding for loft insulation scheme in 700 properties





SHARE training

78 training sessions to over780 participants.(content determined by forums)





Reduce Energy Consumption

Where does water vapour come from?

4 people asleep for 8 hours	2 - 3½ pints
2 people at home all day	2½ - 5½ pts
Cooking	3½ - 7 pints
Bathing, washing dishes etc	1 – 2 pints
Washing clothes	1 – 2 pints
Drying clothes indoors	5 – 13 pints
Bottled gas or paraffin fire	2 – 3 pints





Condensation is most likely to occur:

- in rooms where lots of moisture is produced such as bathrooms and kitchens
- on cold surfaces, such as single glazed windows or metal window frames
- on walls in unheated rooms, particularly at the corner of two external walls
- on "cold spots" caused by cold bridging
- in poorly ventilated spaces, such as inside cupboards or wardrobes or behind furniture placed against outside walls
